Morrison's resume leaves no doubt why she deserves it. For more than half her life, she has brought Niagara's black history to the forefront, speaking whenever and wherever invited.

In the '90s, she was the key figure in saving the BME church ... where many former slaves would congregate after fleeing the U.S. via Niagara's Underground Railroad. The 175-year-old building was declared a heritage site in 2000.

"The woman across the road came and told me she wanted to buy it, tear it down and build a house for her son," she recalls. "It's part of our heritage. It's the only thing left in town that says we've been here, had a presence here, and helped to build a community for over 100 years.

"These are the things I think are important. A lot of people don't."

Her tireless work as a black history advocate has earned Morrison just about every community award Niagara Falls has to offer. Now, it's the province's turn to recognize her.

She helped establish the Norval Johnson Library inside the BME Church. It's the region's most thorough collection of black history and literature.
